A LETTER FROM TIM HARMER

Transformation

When I was much younger, in my teens, there was a very popular mail order course that one could send away for. It was called the 'Charles Atlas' course. Lots of teenage boys, like my brother and I, sent away for it. We had visions of transforming ourselves from seven stone weaklings into strong he men.

Charles Atlas was an American strong man who had developed a system based on dynamic tension which would improve your physique and make you stronger. The theory was perfectly sound and if you followed the course you would develop a muscular physique and get stronger. But the trouble was that the course was so boring because it consisted of holding a series of static positions with your muscles in tension, that my brother and I soon got fed up with it. I was reminded of this the other day when June and I were talking about getting fit again after the Christmas eating season and as I remembered my early teenage years visions of being transformed into a modern day Charles Atlas floated before my eyes.

But of course it isn't that easy, we need to change our whole life style, to apply ourselves over a long period of time, one doesn't get fit and lose weight just like that. As we work at it, we become fitter and firmer, so we hope. But what also happens is that our lifestyle is changed as we accommodate the regular exercise and the new found fitness.

We live in an age which demands instant answers, the instant gratification of desire. However, the transformation that Jesus brings is a life long calling of the Spirit for every Christian to change into the likeness of God.

Jesus came to transform the world and to bring Justice for all. It is interesting to reflect, as I write this magazine letter in the week that my 94 year old father has died, that we now live in a time when the old certainties that our parents knew have gone. My father's Christian faith gave him the framework to live his life. It gave him the moral compass to navigate through life and to pass onto his family. But many, many people are living in a moral and spiritual vacuum. We only have to listen to the news each evening to understand that.

Jesus brought to us a new way of seeing God, a new way of relating to him and a new way of life characterised by humility and service. Inspired by the Spirit we move in the full knowledge of his love for all. If we resolve to deepen our knowledge of God through a commitment to spend time thinking about, praying to and responding to him, then we will continue to be transformed by the renewal of our hearts and minds.

We will come into that wisdom and understanding that comes only from God and then we can continue to share it with others, in the natural way of human sharing. Through friendship, love, care and giving that other person the time that says 'I love you, God loves you'.

Unconditionally, without reservation we say 'He wants to know you and for you to know him'.

The key to our church's effectiveness in reaching out to other people and drawing them into a life of faith and belief will come from our own transformation through a deepening sense of spirituality and knowledge of God in Jesus.

THE E100 CHALLENGE

This scheme is based around 100 carefully selected Bible readings (50 from the Old Testament and 50 from the New Testament) designed to give participants a good understanding of the overall Bible story from Genesis to Revelation. The 'E' stands for Essential and each of the Essential 100 readings ranges from a few verses to a few chapters. In some of our parishes we may be using this tool in the months ahead to help us all understand the Bible much better, but without having to read every single page. Winter Gritting of minor roads.

Cumbria Highways, through contractors Amey, have clear priorities when treating roads in snowy/icy conditions - the A5074 and the C5048 through the village are at priority 1 & 2 respectively and have been kept reasonably clear during the recent severe weather. However the rural minor roads are rarely treated under the current priorities and mostly provided with grit bins/heaps. Knowing that this has caused problems for people living in the smaller communities and dependant on minor roads for access, the Parish Council has placed a contract with David Wilson of Skelmergh who as sub contractor to Amey is also responsible for treating the C5048 He will treat the minor roads to Howe, Row, Tarnside and Starnthwaite as necessary when called out to treat the C5048.

Clearly the cost of this contract until next April will depend on the weather for the rest of the winter but is unlikely to be less than £1000. The Parish Council has agreed to meet these costs out of reserves. For next year (2011/12) the PC will look to keep costs down by sharing equipment and contracts with neighbouring parishes with similar problems, a number of whom have also taken separate action in 2010/11. However we have felt it advisable to add £1000 to the 2011/12 parish precept (equivalent to an additional £2.85 pa on a band D property), to cover these

additional costs in coming years.

NB Parish Salt Scheme: You will no doubt be aware that Cumbria Highways have delivered bulk salt to sites in rural parishes so that they can deal directly with local problems on untreated highways, nominally under the control of Parish Councils. We have authorised our contractor to remove a major part of the stock at the Memorial Hall for use on the minor roads but leaving sufficient for local emergencies and those not helped by the contract's scope.

We do have to emphasise that this salt/grit is for use on the public highways only – not for treating private roads, drives and footpaths; householders should buy in their own supplies of grit/salt in advance to cover this (although to be practical the old, infirm or impoverished can be helped directly from the Parish stock) Please be sensible in your use of this stock – it may not be replenished and others may need it more than you!
