A LETTER FROM MICHAEL WOODCOCK

What kind of world do we live in? I confess to feeling extraordinarily depressed at times as we witness both the recent past and the present day in terms of what mankind can do to itself. I wonder if any of you watched Simon Schama's TV series, The Story of the Jews, last autumn on the BBC? At times it was heart-rending stuff as we heard of centuries of persecution of a people called the Jews, culminating in the horrendous pogrom slaughters of the early 1900s in Tsarist Russia and then the holocaust itself which began in the 1930s. How can human beings turn against each other and cause such violent suffering? And so often it happens in the name of one religion or another.

And then we had that horrendous terrorist atrocity recently in Nairobi where even children were blatantly murdered simply for not being of a certain faith. And suicide bombs detonated outside St. Andrew's church in Peshawar, Pakistan killing worshipping Christians as they left their church that morning.

In many ways it would be perfectly understandable if you were to dismiss any and all religions on this basis. If for one nano-second I thought that what I stood for in proclaiming my Christian faith could be likened to such atrocities I would not blame you for hounding me out of my job and my home. These awful and unspeakable examples sicken and repulse me and I simply cannot understand the mind of anyone who can claim any sort of legitimate right to oppress, persecute, maim or kill another human being in the name of their religion. My faith in God bears absolutely no resemblance to these other kinds of beliefs (in gods or God) that can lead to such dreadful atrocities. Sometimes I feel ashamed to call myself religious if there is any possibility of any of my parishioners classing me in the same bracket as those who have a "religious" belief which can somehow justify violence or murder.

This makes me quite depressed. However, I have to cling on to my belief that the person I choose to follow, Jesus Christ, stands for something entirely different to the extremist religious fanaticism that we often hear about in our news today. The Jesus I know abhors all forms of violence and oppression in the name of religion. He abhors all types of hypocrisy and self-righteousness. He abhors attitudes that seek only to exclude or discriminate, because that goes against the all-embracing nature of GOD who is love.

I am ashamed of my church when it fails to present our Christian faith properly. I feel embarrassed when folks in our villages are left with an impression of the Church which is judgmental, hypocritical or snobbish. That is most definitely not the kind of church in which I wish to be Parson. The reality is that our local churches, I hope, are not like that. We are made up of ordinary people who recognize our imperfections and are trying our best to follow the true example of Jesus Christ and everything he really stands for.

As you read this you may just have celebrated Christmas and be looking into the New Year. I hope and pray that when you hear about the life of our churches in the Two Valleys you will never equate us with the inexcusable distortions of religious belief that are currently present in our world, but instead take us as we are; ordinary villagers who see in the person of Jesus Christ a supreme example to follow (and even to believe in), who makes life better than if we were on our own.

Shoeboxes

A team of 9 from South Cumbria has just returned from a week in Romania, giving out most of your 9,007 gift filled shoeboxes (23% up on last year) to some of the neediest children in Europe. Although many live in unbelievable squalor, it was heartwarming to see a lot of the children in school, where they clearly enjoyed their lessons in bright, friendly and happy classes. Education is where change for the better will really take place, and Boxes of Hope is starting a child sponsorship scheme at Tinca School, where the children can currently attend for only a few hours a day because there is insufficient funding to run the school to capacity.

We gave out shoeboxes in churches, villages, apartment blocks etc. In the city mission in Oradea "Children of the Promise", where orphans and abandoned children are given food and after school activities, they treated us to rousing Christmas songs. One of our team made the apt comment that prior to the trip she imagined we would be taking a little light into the children's lives, but in reality the children brought light into ours. Thank you everyone who supported this year's shoebox campaign in any way, however small. Counting the birds that are counting on you

It will be all eyes to the skies on Saturday, 25^{th} and Sunday, 26^{th} January 2014, as the nation takes part in the RSPB's annual Big Garden Birdwatch.

The activity is the biggest garden wildlife survey in the world and last year almost 600,000 people counted the birds in their garden.

Big Garden Birdwatch, which has been running for 35 years, provides the RSPB with masses of information about changes in numbers of garden birds in winter, and helps to alert conservationists to significant declines in UK garden species such as house sparrows and starlings.

And this year, for the first time, we need you to log some of the other wildlife you see in your garden too. We want to know whether you ever see deer, squirrels, badgers, hedgehogs, frogs and toads in your gardens, to help build an overall picture of how important our gardens are for giving all types of wildlife a home.

Doing the Big Garden Birdwatch is fun and easy, and you don't even need to leave the comfort of your own home. To take part, spend just one hour at any time over the Big Garden Birdwatch weekend noting the highest number of each species seen in your garden or local outside space at any one time. You then simply submit your results to the RSPB, either online at www.rspb.org.uk/birdwatch or in the post.

WINDERMERE REFLECTIONS......

The New Year is a good time to reflect on resolutions for 2014! Here's a thought - a way for all of us to help protect and improve the health of the area is to be careful with our food and other waste.

Fats, oils and food waste are a source of phosphate which we need to keep out of the lakes. You can help to reduce the risk by not pouring fats and oils down the sink (even small amounts can cause problems), not letting food scraps go down the drain and by composting food waste.

We live in a disposable age, with convenient products, which can be used and thrown away. We've got; wet wipes; cotton wool; tissues; nappies; cotton buds and dental floss to name just a few.

Unfortunately, these products are often thrown down the toilet, instead of the bin, causing havoc in the sewers. Some of these items even end up in our rivers and lakes, and millions are spent every year on clearing our drains and sewers.

Lake-friendly New Year resolutions:

- Dispose of fats, oils and greases in the bin not via the sink

The Naming and Circumcision of Jesus

New Year's Day is a significant feast-day in the liturgical calendar, the day when we celebrate Jesus' circumcision. It is accordingly marked in the calendar of Common Worship in red letters, although it is not in bold, which indicates that it doesn't rank quite as highly as, for example, Christmas Day, Epiphany, Easter and so on; it also doesn't rank as highly as the other feast-day associated with Christ's infancy, the Presentation of Christ in the Temple (Candlemas), which we celebrate on 2nd February.

The practice of circumcision had long been in use as a religious rite among the Jews, who regarded it as part of the law of Moses. So it was perfectly normal for Jesus to be circumcised. Interestingly, however, the sole reference to it in the gospels is in Luke 2 v. 21, which is the gospel that is distinguished by having a strong gentile focus. But on reflection we might think that this makes good sense: for an audience not accustomed to circumcision, this significant and inevitable practice needed to be referred to explicitly. Luke tells us is that the ceremony, which was also the occasion for naming the child, took place on the eighth day after Jesus' birth (Luke 2 v. 21). This was the standard time-frame, as we see from the same detail in Luke's reference to the circumcision and naming of Jesus' cousin John (Luke 1 v. 59). In both cases the name conferred on the baby was that given by the angel at the time of conception – in John's case the visitation of the angel Gabriel to John's father Zacharias, and in Jesus' case the visitation of the angel Gabriel to Mary. Both names were significant. John, which comes to us from Greek via Latin, is ultimately derived from a Hebrew name meaning 'graced by Yahweh'; Jesus, which is the Greek form of the Hebrew name 'Joshua', means 'Jehovah / Yahweh saves', an indication in this case of Jesus' role as the saviour of mankind, as foretold by Gabriel.

The first day of January comes eight days after Christmas by the inclusive counting method that was in use for the Roman calendar, which shaped the date sequences of the liturgy in the early centuries of Christianity: that is to say, it is the eighth day if you count both 25th December and 1st January. However, the Feast of the Circumcision could not have been instituted until after the establishment of 25th December as the date for celebrating Christ's birth since the choice of 1st January makes sense only in relation to this being date of Christmas. No dates, either for the birth or the circumcision, are indicated in the gospels, except for the information that the circumcising took place eight days after the birth. The Feast of the Circumcision must have entered the liturgy, therefore, after 336, when December 25th is first recorded as the date for celebrating the Nativity. But it is likely that some time passed before the circumcision was liturgically observed since there is no evidence for it before the mid-500s when, in the western church, the geographical starting-point for the observance seems to have been Gaul, although there is also sixth-century evidence from Spain. It did not become established in Rome until the ninth century, but there is firm evidence that the Anglo-Saxon church observed 1st January as the Feast of the Circumcision from at least the eighth century, probably through direct influence from the church in Gaul, with which they had close contacts.
