A LETTER FROM BRIAN CROWE

For years I have been struck by the beauty of God's creation in this part of the world, but this year I have particularly enjoyed the beautifully landscaped gardens, containing flowers that seem to have thrived after the cold winter and dry early spring. The season began by watching some of the programmes from the Chelsea flower show, but the local gardens and flowers within the Two Valleys area, and even the wild flowers in the fields and hedgerows have been almost equally impressive.

Hilary and I were among many who visited the fifteen open gardens within Brigsteer over the May Bank Holiday week-end, and we also went to Troutbeck the following day, where another twelve gardens were open. We went to the Holker Hall Garden Festival the following week, enjoying the hottest day of the year so far. But I have also been particularly aware of the beauty of the wild flowers in fields, hedgerows and by the side of paths when walking along the Cumbrian Coastal Path. Over a three mile stretch we photographed at least twenty-five different wild flowers, all in flower at the time.

As I have observed the flowers, I have been amazed by their diversity, in structure, texture and colour. I have been astounded by the detail of their design, the intricacy with which they are constructed so that they both survive and thrive, attracting the insects which enable them to flourish. I am writing this before the Crosthwaite flower festival, but I am sure as you read this newsletter, many of you will have visited St Mary's to enjoy the flowers as well as the opportunity to get together again with others from our community.

My abiding reflection from these gardens and their flowers has been that God created a world of astounding beauty. But he hasn't just created the world, set it going, and then abandoned it. Across all the villages within the Two Valleys, within our churches on Sundays we have been following the 'E100' series – a series of the "Essential 100" readings from the Bible which tell the Big Story of the Bible, and its relevance to us today. The churches are all at different stages in their journey, but we have all seen that God did not create his world simply to leave it to its own devices. He wanted to maintain a relationship with his creation, and he chose to do so through wanting to be in relationship with human beings, made in his own image. Unfortunately, humans decided that they wanted to be like God, and by doing so, the relationship was broken.

The story since has shown how God perseveres with us, despite frequent episodes when we choose to walk away from him. It will be fascinating to discover as we go through future weeks within this series, just how far God will go, so that the purpose of his creation is fulfilled and he can enjoy loving relationships not only with people but also with his whole creation.

In Remembrance

Robert Geoffrey Wills (Geoff)

Geoff was born the youngest of three boys at Silverholme on the edge of Windermere at Graythwaite. Geoff was only 3 years old when his mother died. The brothers were separated and Geoff went to live with his grandmother on her farm at Martin in Furness, where his lifelong love of sheep began. After leaving school Geoff worked at Greaves Farm, Field Broughton for the Hutchinson family where he worked with heavy horses. He had a life-long affection for heavy horses.

During any holidays he had, week-ends and evenings, Geoff would spend time going around local farms, together with Brian and Rodney, clipping sheep. He made long lasting friendships with many of the farms he visited. Geoff took great pride in his work; whether it was clipping sheep, hedging or stone walling, it had to be done right. Geoff had many interests all farming related. He enjoyed following sheep dog trials and judged at many. He made Shepherd's crooks and sticks and also judged at many local shows. A few years ago he was judging sticks at Mucker show over in Swaledale and afterwards on a warm summer evening everyone had followed the band through the village down to the church singing hymns as they went. He really enjoyed that day. He enjoyed attending sales and auctions whether it was sheep, poultry, old tools and machinery or furniture. But one of the best things Geoff enjoyed was visiting his many friends for a cup of tea, a good crack and a laugh - he was always interested in what was going on locally. Geoff worked hard, he was genuine, honest and proud. He was a man of simple pleasures who had a ready laugh. He had little in the way of possessions but a wealth of friends. He died as he lived a contented man.

Esther Bowman

Esther was born in Wath upon Dearne, Yorkshire in 1932, a heritage of which she was always proud. When she was three her father had a mining accident and the family moved south to Worcester Park in Surrey, where she remained until she was married. As a young girl she attended classes on dance and acrobatics at Miss Knight's Dancing Academy and appeared in many shows at the Kingston Empire. She did not enjoy school life and her mother was keen to get her into secretarial work, so she took on extra work to enable her to send Esther to secretarial college. Esther enjoyed the work and became a legal secretary and worked for several firms before joining a solicitor in Sloane Street,

Chelsea. Her close friend, June, lived in the next road and they spent their leisure time together, mainly cycling, ice skating and following ice hockey. This is how she met Eric - completely by chance and they spent many happy times skating together. Eric and Esther were married in March 1951 and moved to a house in Stoneleigh, near Worcester Park. It was very neglected and there was a lot to do, but things had to wait as Eric had been deferred and had to join the Royal Engineers where he was posted to York. This was a difficult time for Esther, emotionally and financially, and she learned how to make the most of things. Lynn was born to them with great joy in 1955 and they continued to live in Stoneleigh, then Guildford, and latterly Chipstead, all in Surrey. A work colleague of Eric's, Bill Adam, and his wife, Sybil introduced them to the Lake District and they had many holidays with them in the Lickle Valley and with Nell Dobson at Silver Birch on Cartmel Fell. They loved it so much that they bought Guide Post Cottage in 1983 and Mearsons in 1986. Esther got great satisfaction from the garden and she drew particular pleasure from her sweet peas, of which she cut off the tendrils and side shoots every day. For the past seven years she was not able to do as much as she wanted, which was a great frustration. She carried on with great courage and fortitude and was always cheerful, ready with a smile and even at the end was considering others.

Gladys Swarbrick

Gladys lived and farmed in Cumbria all her life, the last 70 or so of her years in Meathop, in the parish of Witherslack Meathop & Ulpha. She was born Gladys Ursula Rigby in Coniston on 25 April 1925, the eldest daughter of 9 children. Her family farmed at Town End in Coniston, then moving to Docker near Grayrigg. Her early days were spent delivering milk around Coniston and making the butter on Thursdays. It was at this young age that she was taught to play cards – a hobby for playing whist that she continued at Witherslack whist drives for many years.

Her family then moved to Meathop, becoming neighbours to the Swarbricks, and this is how Gladys met her late husband Gordon. They were married at St Paul's Church, Witherslack in1949 in a double wedding with Gladys' sister Jean, and made their home at Kate Farm. Life was family and farming, Gladys and Gordon raising 6 children who brought along 12 grandchildren and 10 great grandchildren. Gladys never learnt to drive a tractor or car, instead working the horses, thresher and on the farm, milking cows until she was well into her 60's.

As well as the general running of the farm and looking after livestock, Gladys would keep the books, consult tide timetables for bringing sheep off the marsh, stand the vegetable stall at Stramongate Market with Gordon and every year call upon all family and friends to help pluck and dress the turkeys and geese she brought on for Christmas. As well as playing cards, her other hobbies included making rag rugs – many still in commission, following snooker on the TV and more recently attending Tea and Chat in the village.

A dear Mum, Sister, Auntie, Cousin, Friend, Gran and Great-Granny, Gladys will be sorely missed, and so fondly remembered. She always said she wished she had kept a diary - she loved recounting tales of her life, and often remarked, 'I've had a hard life, but I've had a wonderful life'.

SUFFRAGAN SEE OF PENRITH

The Queen has approved the nomination of the Venerable Robert John Freeman, BSc, MA, Archdeacon of Halifax, in the diocese of Wakefield, to the Suffragan See of Penrith, in the Diocese of Carlisle, in succession to the Right Reverend James William Scobie Newcome, MA, on his translation to the See of Carlisle on the 31 July 2009.

The Venerable Robert Freeman (aged 58), studied first at St John's College, Durham and then at Fitzwilliam College, Cambridge while he trained for the ordained ministry at Ridley Hall, Cambridge. He served his curacy at Blackpool St John, in Blackburn Diocese from 1977 to 1981. From 1981 to 1985 he was Team Vicar at Chigwell, in Chelmsford Diocese. From 1985 to 1999 he was Vicar at The Church of the Martyrs Leicester in Leicester Diocese. From 1994 to 2003 he was Honorary Canon at Leicester Cathedral and from 1995 to 1998 he was Rural Dean of Christianity South. He was National Advisor in Evangelism for the Archbishops' Council from 1999 to 2003. Since 2003 he has been Archdeacon at Halifax.

Robert Freeman is married to Chris. They have three daughters.

His interests include time spent with family, computer technology and internet development, walking and travelling, classic Motown, electric blues and rock, computer games, reluctant gardening, reading crime and action-adventure fiction. Until recently he was Chair of the Christian Enquiry Agency (www.christianity.org.uk) and continues to be the Chair of the innovative website www.rejesus.co.uk

The main thing we noticed was that it was virtually impossible to get any kind of variety into our diets. There really is only a certain amount you can do with rice, pasta, carrots and onions! We did our best but it came to be quite a struggle towards the end, and it amazes me that so many people have to live like that for their entire lives. What of course makes it worse is that those who actually do live below the Extreme Poverty Line have to factor in extra costs such as accommodation, education, healthcare.... Had we had to do this too, I honestly think it would have been impossible, and we would have been lucky to have lasted a day. To those of you who sponsored me, thank you so much, it was greatly appreciated. I managed to raise over £700 for Salvation Army International Development which I am really pleased with, and I know the money will have gone to a worthwhile cause.

Has your boss stopped you taking holiday? Have you not been paid for holidays? Have you left a job with holiday not yet taken and not been paid for it?

If so, you are not alone. Every year we see thousands of people seeking advice on their right to paid holiday. Citizens Advice is campaigning for a Fair Employment Agency to protect workers and target rogue employers. We would like you to tell us your experiences because it will help make a stronger case. While most working people take their right to paid holidays for granted, many others are forced to work all year without a break, or only allowed unpaid leave. People missing out tend to be in unglamorous but essential jobs in small, non-unionised workplaces such as care homes, hairdressers, bars, restaurants, hotels and shops. Others work in building and decorating, clothing and food processing factories, or contract cleaning. The majority are women, many juggling part-time work with family commitments.

Employers may lack understanding of the law, but much appears to be deliberate, with rogue employers using a range of excuses to avoid meeting their legal obligations to their workforce. This means workers may be unaware of their rights, others decide against taking action for fear of losing their job, or are put off by the daunting, stressful and time-consuming prospect of an employment tribunal – at present the only option open to workers denied their right to paid holiday.

CHRISTMAS LETTERS TO PRISIONERS

CLP exists to benefit prisoners and staff at Christmas time and has been in existence since 1880, sending handwritten letters to about 40% of the prisons via chaplains. The letters are greatly valued by the recipients, many of whom receive little or no other correspondence at Christmas. By promoting the basics of the Gospel we try to prompt contact with the Chaplains and give them a "launch pad" from which to take things further.

The letters are written well in advance and submitted for consideration by our Reading Committee who make their selection to approve about 16 original letters. These are then copied throughout the year by hand and prepared for distribution in readiness for the festive season.

We need over 30,000 letters each year and need more copyists to help us in this task, which begins in the Autumn of each year, continuing through to the following September.
