A LETTER FROM

How do we treat our leaders? I am thinking in particular about our political leaders. Undoubtedly politicians have been perceived with growing cynicism in recent years; some of this has been deserved and of their own making. However, I have a niggling concern when I see how anyone who ventures into public service is treated by the general media and by the general public. When you observe elections campaigns, or simply tune into political discussion or debate, it seems to me that almost all politicians are dismissed, argued with for the sake of it, and sometimes verbally abused from the outset. "Innocent until proven guilty" is upheld for everyone else, but not for the public servant. There seems to be a pervading culture of wanting to entrap, accuse and bring down anyone who has the courage to enter into politics.

As a result of this pervading culture, you then have to ask yourself, who on earth would choose to stand for public office knowing that they are going be treated so disdainfully, aggressively and as if they are most definitely guilty of something before having any chance of proving themselves innocent? Let alone the intrusion on their families which can come as well. If we persist in treating our leaders in this way, then we will end up with very few people of quality putting themselves forward in the first place. Why would they? Who would choose a life of abuse?

The Christian tradition is that we are called to pray for our leaders, to pray for those in authority over us so that they have our support, but also so that they will be kept accountable to a higher authority with higher ideals and values than ours (1 Timothy 2:2; Romans 13:1). If God has somehow delegated authority to our leaders, they are also to be held to account to a greater degree.

What kind of leaders do we really want? If we desire those old-fashioned virtues of integrity, duty and a deep sense of public service, then we need to be encouraging our leaders in these directions rather than seeking to tear them down even before they have begun.

Now, of course, politicians have brought much of the mistrust we have in them upon themselves, no argument there. It works both ways; if we are to trust them, they need to be trustworthy and need calling to account by us at all times. But will we ever find trustworthy people to serve in public office if we treat them as we do now?

I wave no party political banner – not a sensible thing to do in my position – so my concerns transcend any party politics. They simply arise out of my observations of the trends in recent years. We have seen some good (perhaps) politicians lose their Westminster seats recently. We have seen others reluctant to throw their hat into the ring for party leaderships. Who will we be left with unless we do some encouraging of the right people to enter into public service?

"First of all, then, I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanks-givings should be made for everyone, ² for kings and all who are in high positions, so that we may lead a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and dignity. ³ This is right and is acceptable in the sight of God our Saviour."

The Island was established as a penal colony initially to provide food for other penal colonies in less hospitable places and also because of the large number of indigenous pine trees growing there which looked likely prospects for supplying wood for ship's masts. Unfortunately the rats coming ashore from the ships eventually destroyed the crops and the wood proved unsuitable so the colony was discontinued. After a period of about 10 years a second penal colony was established but unfortunately became somewhat notorious for its inhumane. degrading and brutal treatment of convicts to the extent that many preferred death to continued existence in the colony and it too was discontinued. A subsequent third settlement consisted of people moving from Pitcairn Island, home of Fletcher Christian and his fellow mutineers following the mutiny on the Bounty. Many of the names of these mutineers and their descendants can still be found in graveyards on the Island.

PEACOCKS, PELICANS AND POMEGRANATES

One of the things I like doing when I'm travelling around is looking at churches — the buildings themselves, of course, but also the ways in which various aspects of Christianity are expressed in carvings of wood and stone, stained glass windows, and surviving wall paintings. And there are even greater delights abroad, where the symbolism may have slightly different details and emphases, and where, in many countries, the interior walls are completely covered with Old and New Testament scenes, sometimes also with panels of animals and plants. I thought that for July, prompted by this year's travels, I would deal with three of the recurrent symbols: peacocks, pelicans, and pomegranates.

The peacock, not surprisingly given its unusual beauty, figures in many mythologies. In ancient Persia and Babylon, for example, it was associated with Paradise and the Tree of Life. In Christian art it is also associated with the paradisal garden, often specifically heaven itself as the eternal paradise. A peacock depicted drinking from a vessel symbolises the Christian believer drinking from the waters of eternal life. Yet another interpretation is that the 'eyes' of the tail-feathers symbolise the all-seeing God. But there is a further very powerful interpretative strand which has its origins with the ancient Greeks, who believed that the flesh of peafowls did not decay after death. This understanding was transmitted to the late antique and early medieval worlds, as was much else of classical 'scientific' belief, and was drawn upon for Christian iconography, so that this supposedly non-decaying bird was taken to signify immortality. These various interpretations were never meant to be mutually exclusive: rather, they work together in suggestively reinforcing ways.

Pelicans symbolise the Passion of Jesus and the Eucharist since it was believed that the female pierced its own breast and fed its young with its own blood when no other food was available. This again is a belief found, with some variation of detail, in a number of mythologies. Perhaps the idea began because it can look as if a pelican, when feeding young, is stabbing its own breast with its beak, although in reality it is pressing its pouch onto its breast in order to empty it fully. As an extension of its popularity as a Christian symbol, pelican imagery was much used in medieval heraldry and also in the context of the creation of a national church in England, with the monarch at its head. There is an example of this in the Walter Art Gallery in Liverpool where a miniature of Elizabeth I, painted by Nicholas Hilliard, shows the queen wearing a pelican, while on the title page of the King James Bible (1611) there is an oval showing a pelican feeding her young, signifying that the king's English bible was meant to 'feed' the faithful through making available to them the divine words of salvation.

Pomegranates, like peacocks, are associated with paradise, as the Qur'an makes clear. But, again in common with peacocks, the pomegranate has a particular association with the resurrection because the fruit, often shown bursting open and revealing its many seeds, was adopted as a symbol of the fullness of Jesus' suffering and resurrection. In the earliest known depiction of Christ in a mosaic there is a pomegranate on either side of his head. Interestingly for us, this mosaic, dating from the fourth century, comes from Hinton Starry in Dorset and can be seen in the British Museum. As with the peacock and the pelican, the pomegranate's exotic nature points to the eastern origins of Christianity and its imagery.
